A last minute change left us without our planned speaker. While this might be a problem for some clubs, it was not for ours. **Doug Stutz** simply called on our team utility player and super secretary, **Bob Evans**, to fill the gap. **Doug** noted that we all know that **Bob** does a great job as our Secretary. What most of us do not know, is how much work (much of it unseen) Bob does for the club.

Modestly, **Bob** told us about his history in Newark and with Kiwanis. Bob has lived and worked in Newark for 50 years as the owner and operator of the Newark Family Shoe Store in downtown Newark. During that time, he served for 27 years as secretary for the Downtown Newark Association (DNA). Over the years, DNA has had a few name changes, but it is still dedicated to preserving the past while improving and promoting the future of downtown Newark. Its members include merchants, business owners, property owners, civil servants and residents of Newark.

Bob has been a Kiwanian for 27 years and, more importantly to us, he has been our club secretary since 1995. We all know that (as written in the "1918-2008 Club History") *the absolute importance of a good Secretary is beyond dispute. The Secretary provides continuity, institutional memory, and a sense of tradition through changing administrations. The Secretary provides important attention to organizational and operational details and procedures while maintaining the records for an ongoing program.* We are very fortunate to have **Bob Evans** as our secretary.

How have things changed? **Bob** reported that the club had about 125 members when he joined. Club meetings have not always been at the Buckingham House: previously we met at the YWCA and the Elks. When **Bob** began selling shoes, shoes were sold only in shoe stores (not in big box stores or department stores). Kids did not wear tennis shoes to school and their parents told them what shoes to wear.

We owe Bob much thanks for his services and loyalty. He has provided our club with a great measure of strength over the years. By the way, one thing that **Bob** failed to mention is that he has been selected as Kiwanian of the year three times!

Bob — thanks for being a Kiwanian and for being our Secretary.

June 21, 2010 Club Leaders Tackle Immediate Problems: Meeting Location & Caterer



Doug Stutz describes our immediate problem and challenges us to find the solution.

We have known for a while that the Historical Society, the owner of the Buckingham House, was grappling with economic problems. We also knew that they might make changes impacting rent and catering arrangements. What we did not know was how quickly these changes would occur. Today, *Doug Stutz* reported that the Board of the Historical Society had not only decided what they needed to do, they were making the changes now. Immediately, we must pay more rent per meeting, and we must use the caterer that they have selected. The question is “what do we do?” — A simple question without a simple answer.

So — what do we do? *Doug* rolled up his sleeves, got busy and challenged us to join him and the Board in finding a solution. To

give us a head start, *Doug* had asked *Michael Harris* to explore options for a meeting place and for a caterer. On an interim basis, we will pay the higher rent and meet at the Buckingham House, We will also use their selected, and exclusive caterer; again paying the increased cost.

Club members like meeting at the Buckingham House and were pleased with the previous caterer, but cost is a major concern. *Michael* has talked with many organizations/businesses about meeting space and/or catering service. No single organization and/or caterer appeared to meet our all of needs including cost avoidance. We need a central location with no stairs and plenty of parking. We need a reasonably priced lunch and we need to meet on Mondays. *Michael* told us what he learned; alternatives were discussed. *Michael* will gather more information to enable the Board to make a decision within a month.

Goodwill GoodGuides Program

Cynthia Dawes spoke about Goodwill's new youth mentoring program: the Goodwill GoodGuides Program. Licking County Goodwill was one of 56 Goodwill Industries selected to receive a grant to help mentor area youths. The goal is to see these youths through to graduation and to keep them from dropping out and attempting to obtain their GED. This is a 22 month grant. They are currently setting up mentor to mentee matches. It is all voluntary with meetings for one hour per week.. The students also participate with the Goodwill facilitators monthly doing group team building activities.

Goodwill is currently looking for mentors and special guest speakers during their monthly activity. They are trying to make the Program permanent and are searching for grants. The 1st day this started was 1-11-10 and they have one dozen matches and are aiming for 100.
