Ed Cobb

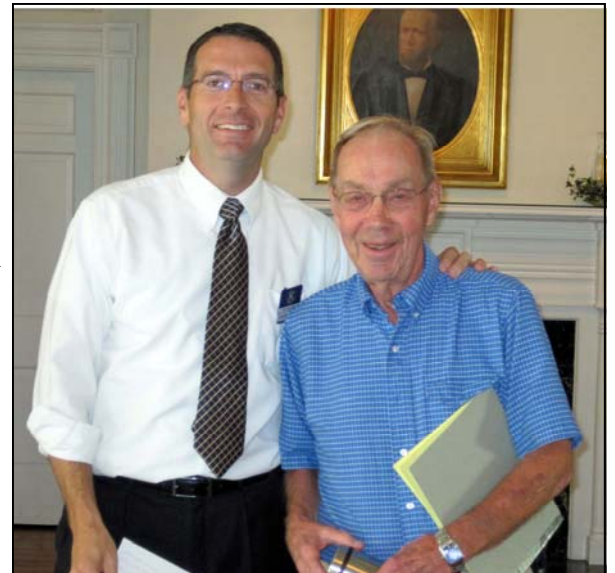
*Ed Cobb* is the first of two generations of Cobbs who have made major contributions to Kiwanis and our community. We know Ed's son (and fellow Kiwanian), *Ted*, for his Camp O'Bannon leadership. *Ed* has been a member of our Newark Kiwanis club for 34 years (since August, 1976), serving on almost every committee we have. Ed recalls that club members raised \$40,000 (mostly through member donations) to support the KI worldwide program to buy iodized salt for distribution in third world countries.

Ed was born in 1930 in Connecticut where he lived for 16 years before moving to Massachusetts. He went to high school at a Quaker Boarding School where, according to Ed, he learned many things — but learning how to have fun was not included. Ed went to college in Marietta, OH. After college, he moved back to New England to work for Owens Corning. But Uncle Sam had other plans for Ed: he was drafted and served for two years in Korea (Ed — thanks for your service to our Country.)

Soon after returning to Rhode Island, Ed met and married Barbara, the woman he would share his life with. He went back to work for Owens Corning in textile research. Now, textile research doesn't sound real exciting — unless it means working to make space shuttles safer by installing non-flammable materials. This work took Ed to Cape Canaveral where he saw three launchings. In 1973, Owens Corning moved their operation to Granville — bringing Ed and his family to Ohio.

Ed's service and contributions to our community are many, too many to cover here. He helped develop a business plan and find a warehouse for the Food Pantry; Ed continues to serve on their Board. He also helped the Boy Scouts grow and merge into the Simon Kenton Council which serves central Ohio. He has helped, and continues to assist and/or serve on many boards including the Excel Academy, the Licking County United Way, SCORE and his church.

When asked how he was able to overcome complex obstacles to solving problems faced by these organizations, Ed replied: "If you have a credible plan for a good program, the community will provide support and make it happen." That is true, but it is Ed who really makes things happen.

Tricia has been the Executive Director of The Woodlands for the past three years. Prior to that she worked as a case manager and then as the director of the New Beginnings. The New Beginnings provides a home and assistance for women and children who are victims of domestic violence.

The Woodlands provides many different services to families and children facing challenges to meet their physical, financial, psychological and emotional needs. Service options include outpatient counseling, outreach services, the Woodlands AIDS Task Force and the Center for New Beginnings for shelter and services. Unfortunately, the tough economic times forced the Family Connections Center to be closed.

The Woodlands has a positive message for the people it serves, (who sadly are mostly below the poverty level); The Woodlands tells them: “Life Can Change. The Woodlands is your community resource.”

### The ELIMINATE Project

With **The ELIMINATE Project**, Kiwanis International and UNICEF have joined forces to eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus. This deadly disease steals the lives of 60,000 innocent babies and 30,000 mothers each year. The effects of the disease are excruciating — tiny newborns suffer repeated, painful convulsions and extreme sensitivity to light and touch. To eliminate MNT from the Earth by 2015, 129 million mothers and their future babies must be immunized. This requires vaccines, syringes, safe storage, transportation, thousands of skilled staff and more. It will take \$110 million — and the dedicated work of UNICEF and every member of the Kiwanis family.

Kiwanis and UNICEF joined forces to tackle iodine deficiency disorders, achieving one of the most significant public health successes of the 20th century. Now, they are eliminating MNT from the face of the Earth. And in doing so, the project will reach the poorest, most neglected mothers and babies with additional lifesaving health care. The end of this one disease means the beginning of better health for so many families.

### **Maternal/Neonatal Tetanus (MNT)**

What is MNT?

In 40 countries around the world, maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT) can quickly turn the joy of childbirth into tragedy. MNT kills one baby every nine minutes. Its effects are excruciating — tiny newborns suffer repeated, painful convulsions and extreme sensitivity to light and touch. There is little hope of survival. And tetanus kills mothers too.

### **Who suffers from MNT?**

MNT is caused when tetanus spores, found in soil everywhere, come into contact with open cuts during childbirth. The disease strikes the poorest of the poor, the geographically hard to reach and those without health care.

### **Can MNT be stopped?**

Yes! MNT is highly preventable. Just three doses of a 60-cent immunization protect mothers, who then pass on the immunity to their future babies. Together, Kiwanis and UNICEF can stop this disease.

### **Why hasn't MNT been eliminated already?**

UNICEF *has* helped to successfully eliminate MNT in many countries. But in 40 countries in Africa, Asia, Europe and North America, it still strikes babies and mothers who have little or no access to health care — either because they are poor, live in remote areas or are caught in humanitarian emergencies. More funds and resources are needed to reach all babies and mothers at risk.

### **What will it take to eliminate MNT from the Earth by 2015?**

129 million mothers and their future babies must be immunized. This requires vaccines, syringes, safe storage, transportation, thousands of skilled staff and more. It will take \$110 million — and the dedicated work of UNICEF and every member of the Kiwanis family.
